# **REGULAR MEETING OF SOUTH EUCLID CITY COUNCIL**

Council President Jane Goodman called the meeting to order and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

#### Roll Call

**Present:** Council President Pro Tem Dennis Fiorelli, Councilman Joe Frank, Councilman Marty Gelfand, Councilwoman Ruth Gray, Councilman Ed Icove, Council President Jane Goodman. **Absent:** Councilman Jason Russell

President Goodman informed the audience Economic Development Director Michael Love would be acting as Clerkof-Council in place of Keith Benjamin. She also informed the audience that Councilman Russell was out-of-town for work.

### Report of the Mayor

Mayor Welo had the following to report:

- The Mayor reported that Community Services Director Keith Benjamin, Housing Director Sally Martin, Service Director Jim Anderson, and Law Director Michael Lograsso were absent and excused from this meeting. All other directors were present. The Mayor reported on the success of the recent Community Garage Sale and the Community Shred Day. The Mayor mentioned South Euclid Residents and Chefs Eric Rogers and Frank lacobucci were recently profiled in the Plain Dealer Taste Section.
- City Engineer Andy Blackley: Reported that the 2017 Road Program is nearing completion. He mentioned that work continues on the Grosvenor Road Project and that the watermain repair project is about to get underway. He reported that he will soon be asking Council for authorization to bid a manhole repair project, as the NEORSD has identified manholes in critical need of repair due to cross connections. A new Dominion Gas project is expected to begin soon in the Argonne-Avondale Neighborhood. Council President Goodman asked if Dominion could make a donation to the new Legacy Tree Fund, for trees that the company may have killed during previous projects. Engineer Blackley answered that the Service Director is working with Dominion on this issue. Council President Goodman also asked when the section of Cedar Road from the Lyndhurst city limit to South Green Road will be resurfaced. Engineer Blackley mentioned this resurfacing is part of a larger County, multi-city project which is funded. He is hopeful work will start in 2018.
- Police Chief Kevin Nietert: Reported on an armed robbery which took place at the Sts. Margaret & Gregory Credit Union on Saturday 5/20 in the morning. The suspects have not been caught but it is very similar to robberies of banks and credit unions from around the region. The FBI has joined the investigation.
- Building Commissioner Eric Tuck-Macalla: Reported that the Marc's Plaza Project at Mayfield & Green is
  progressing well. The pharmacy trailer is in place. It is expected that the shopping center will close for
  demolition on June 11<sup>th</sup> and the new center should open in early September. At Oakwood, Season's Kosher
  Market has pulled permits and should be starting construction soon and Moe's will also open on June 1<sup>st</sup>. He
  reported that he met with an engineer regarding the new South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools Transportation
  Facility and that plan review and approval process will likely begin soon.
- Mayor Welo: The Mayor concluded her report by thanking residents Madelon Watts and Linda Pagon for their work in organizing Democracy Day. She also reminded everyone to attend the annual Memorial Day Parade Monday May 29<sup>th</sup> at 9:00am.

# Opening Meeting of Council Related to Agenda Specific Items

President Goodman offered the floor to anyone in the audience who had signed in to speak at the meeting concerning items related to the agenda. The following individuals then addressed City Council:

- Charles Turner, 4549 Lilac Road, stated that he is former policeman who introduced the DARE Program into
  multiple schools. He spent 20 years as a law enforcement officer, and as Council looks at medical marijuana
  this evening, he spoke to how he has seen kids ruin their lives by using drugs. He said that people forget
  marijuana is a gateway drug and kids will now be more easily exposed to medical marijuana. Permitting
  medical marijuana facilities in South Euclid is not a well thought-out idea.
- Linda Pagon, 684 Parkside Blvd., spoke on medical marijuana and stated she is a trained clinical
  psychologist. She stated that medical marijuana is a significant precursor to heroin. She said that street
  parking should not be permitted for medical marijuana businesses, they should be required to be at least
  500 feet from any residence, there should only be one store permitted in the whole city, and display areas
  should be limited. She feels this legislation is designed to eventually accommodate legalized recreational
  use.
- Marissa Pappas, 1701 East 13<sup>th</sup> Street, Cleveland, stated she is a CSU student and spoke in support of the amended Ord. 08-17 which would exempt certain incidents of domestic violence from criminal nuisance laws. She thanked Councilman Gelfand for bringing forward this legislation and stated she has worked with neighboring communities to pass similar legislation. She told Council that passing this legislation makes the community a more equitable and better place.

There being no additional attendees wishing to speak, the open meeting was closed.

## Report of Council Committees:

<u>Safety Committee:</u> Councilman Gelfand reported on the 6:00pm Safety Committee Meeting, where Ord. 08-17 was discussed. Two items concerning the criminal nuisance law were discussed. The first item concerns the creation of stricter penalties if a firearm is used in an incident where the criminal nuisance law is applied. The second item would exempt certain instances of domestic violence from the criminal nuisance law. Both amendments to the criminal nuisance law were approved by the Safety Committee, and the amended Ord. 08-17 will be before Council for Third Reading at the June 12<sup>th</sup> Meeting. Councilman Fiorelli, who initially introduced the legislation, then read it into the record for second reading.

Prep work for the June town hall meetings, as outlined in the newest edition of the South Euclid Magazine, was also discussed. Council will be working on an amendment to the Salary Ordinance concerning the salaries of board and commission members.

CREATING NEW TITLE NINE "MEDICAL MARIJUANA CONTROL PROGRAM" OF PART SEVEN "PLANNING AND ZONING CODE" OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SOUTH EUCLID, OHIO. **THIRD READING.** 

President Goodman stated that the legislation had been thoroughly discussed in committee and only regulates medical marijuana. The legislation gives the city a lot of control over how medical marijuana is permitted in South Euclid and can evolve over time. Councilman Frank discussed how the legislation can ensure medical marijuana helps sick people and reminded everyone that the state chose to legalize medical marijuana so now the city must regulate it. Councilwoman Gray stated that medical marijuana is moving forward and it is important that South Euclid uses this opportunity to regulate the industry, benefit economically, and help people with chronic conditions. There being no further discussion on the legislation, Council President Goodman requested the roll call for Ord. 04-17. **Action:** Motion to Approve Legislation, **Moved by** Council President Jane Goodman, **Seconded by** Councilman Joe Frank.

- Linda Pagon, 684 Parkside Blvd., Stated that on-street parking for medical marijuana businesses should be prohibited. She also hopes City Council will continue to look at the medical marijuana legislation to be sure the industry is being regulated appropriately.
- Charles Turner, 4549 Lilac Road, wished everyone a happy Memorial Day and complemented the recent
  work performed on the War Memorial. He thanked our forefathers for granting freedom of speech and stated
  those who complain against government should not be punished. He complemented Chief Nietert on how
  handsome he looks in civilian clothes and stated that South Euclid officials need to read the Constitution
  and know what is in it.
